MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL
CITY OF CARTHAGE, MISSOURI
July 24, 2018

The Carthage City Council met in regular session on the above date at 6:30 P.M. in the City Hall Council Chambers with Mayor Dan Rife presiding. Fire Chief Roger Williams gave the invocation and Police Chief Greg Dagnan led the flag salute.

The following Council Members answered roll call: Darren Collier, Brady Beckham, Kirby Newport, Juan Topete, Tim Shields, Ceri Otero, Mike Daugherty and Alan Snow. Council Members James Harrison, Tim Shields and David Armstrong were absent. City Administrator Tom Short and City Attorney Nate Dally were present.

The following Department Heads were present: Police Chief Greg Dagnan, Fire Chief Roger Williams, Public Works Director Zeb Carney, Parks Director Alan Bull and City Clerk Traci Cox.

Mr. Daugherty made a motion, seconded by Mr. Snow, to approve the minutes of the July 10, 2018 Council Meeting. Motion carried unanimously.

Mayor Rife reported on the presentation of a Marian Days Proclamation presented at the Friendship Dinner.

During Citizens Participation Period: Mark Elliff, President of the Chamber of Commerce and Economic Development Director, reported on his attendance at the Missouri Economic Development Council Conference and the Best in the Midwest Summit. Auna' Willis, Carthage Humane Society employee, was present to update the council on progress with the feral cat program. Abi Almandinger discussed the America in Bloom project and encouraged council members to attend the Carthage in Bloom community forum on July 27.

Mr. Collier reported the Budget, Ways and Means Committee is between meetings with the next meeting scheduled for August 13.

Ms. Otero reported the Committee on Insurance/Audit and Claims met on this date in the Council Chambers and approved the claims. Ms. Otero made a motion, seconded by Mr. Beckham, to approve the Tuition Reimbursement Agreement with two dispatchers. Motion carried.

Mr. Collier reported the Public Safety Committee meeting scheduled for July 16 was cancelled due to lack of quorum. Mr. Collier made a motion, seconded by Mr. Daugherty, to approve the requests from the CMR for Marian Days services including trash service, road closures, and providing security. Motion carried.

Mr. Beckham reported the Public Services Committee was between meetings with the next meeting scheduled for August 8.

Mr. Daugherty reported the Public Works Committee was between meetings with the next meeting scheduled for August 7.

Special Committee and Board Liaison reports were given by Mr. Topete for the Tree Board and Kellogg Lake Board, Ms. Otero for the Carthage Humane Society and Harry S Truman Coordinating Council, and Mr. Collier for the Carthage Water & Electric Board.

Mayor Rife reported on his attendance at the Friendship Dinner at the CMR and an economic development meeting.

During Council Member reports, Mr. Daugherty applauded Mark Elliff on his work to help Eli Bruton place a Welcome to Carthage sign at Liberty Tree.

City Attorney Nate Dally reported on his attendance at the City Attorney Conference.

Police Chief Greg Dagnan reminded City Officials of the Marian Days Tour on July 31.

Fire Chief Roger Williams stated his crew was preparing for Marian Days and gave a report on the construction progress for Fire Station #2.

Parks Director Alan Bull reported the Central Park Sidewalk project is moving forward with concrete being poured this week.

City Administrator Tom Short reported on the following: a meeting with the City Clerk and representatives from Beimdiek Insurance and Aetna regarding employee health insurance claims and an employee Wellness Program, discussions with department heads to reconcile capital projects, discussions for replacing Parks Director upon his retirement, progress on office design for IT Department, the Carthage in Bloom meeting, the Planning and Zoning meeting, and the Marian Days guided tour.

The Committee on Claims filed a report in the amount of \$2,954,987.37 against the following funds: General Revenue \$105,169.72, Public Health \$121,161.78, Parks Stormwater \$204,414.53, Public Safety \$741.00, Golf Course \$26,622.95, Parks & Rec \$23.68, Judicial Education \$315.18, Capital Improvements \$281,894.08, Payroll \$214,644.45 and Carthage Water & Electric \$2,000,000.00. Ms. Otero made a motion, seconded by Mr. Daugherty, to accept the report and allow the claims. Motion carried.

Mr. Daugherty made a motion, seconded by Mr. Collier, to approve Resolution 1842, a Resolution adopting a revised Policemen's and Firemen's Pension Plan Investment Policy, as recommended by the Policemen's and Firemen's Pension Board. Resolution passed.

Mr. Daugherty made a motion, seconded by Ms. Otero, to approve Resolution 1843, a Resolution adopting a City of Carthage Investment Policy for public funds conforming to the Constitution of the State of Missouri and the City Charter, for the City of Carthage, Missouri. Resolution passed.

Mr. Daugherty made a motion, seconded by Mr. Collier, to approve Resolution 1844, a Resolution providing for the formal acceptance of a donation by the City Council of the City of Carthage, Missouri pursuant to City Policy. Resolution passed.

Ms. Otero made a motion, seconded by Mr. Newport, to approve Resolution 1845, a Resolution of the Council of the City of Carthage, Missouri authorizing the approval of Change Order to the construction contract for the River Street and Fairview Avenue Intersection Improvements Project. Resolution passed.

During closing remarks, Mr. Beckham noted that although he voted in favor of Resolution 1843, he wasn't in favor of the city having excess funds to invest. Ms. Otero and Mr. Daugherty discussed their attendance at the Friendship Dinner and the documentary they viewed.

Mr. Snow made a motion, seconded by Mr. Collier, to close the meeting according to Section 610.021 (1) RSMO, the agenda includes the possibility of a vote to close part of the meeting to discuss legal actions, causes of action or litigation involving a public governmental body and any confidential or privileged communications between a public governmental body or its representatives and its attorneys thereof followed by a roll call vote on the board of 7 yeas and no nays. Motion carried.

CLOSED SESSION

Mr. Daugherty made a motion, seconded by Ms. Otero, to return to the regular session of the Council Meeting followed by a roll call vote of 7 yeas and no nays. Motion carried.

Mr. Daugherty made a motion, seconded by Mr. Beckham, to adjourn the regular session of the Council Meeting. Motion carried and meeting adjourned at 7:20 PM.

ORDINANCE NO. _____

AN ORDINANCE LEVYING GENERAL TAXES UPON REAL PROPERTY LOCATED WITHIN THE CITY OF CARTHAGE, JASPER COUNTY, MISSOURI FOR THE YEAR 2018, FOR GENERAL REVENUE PURPOSES AND OTHER PURPOSES, AND FIXING THE RATES THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CARTHAGE, JASPER COUNTY, MISSOURI as follows:

SECTION I: That a tax be and the same is hereby levied for the year 2018, upon all real property which is subject to taxation for municipal purposes under the statutes of the State of Missouri, within the corporate limits of the City of Carthage, Jasper County, Missouri as follows:

First, for General Revenue purposes, 0.3541 cents per One Hundred Dollars assessed valuation.

Second, for the purpose of maintaining the Public Library for the City of Carthage, 0.1768 cents per One Hundred Dollars assessed valuation.

Third, for the purpose of maintaining Public Parks and Recreation within the City of Carthage, 0.1528 cents per One Hundred Dollars assessed valuation.

Fourth, for the purpose of maintaining the Public Health of the City of Carthage, 0.0805 cents per One Hundred Dollars assessed valuation.

SECTION II: This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval.



AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE A MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE CITY OF CARTHAGE AND THE JASPER COUNTY SHERIFF’S OFFICE PROVIDING FOR PRISONER HOUSING FOR INMATES WITH MUNICIPAL CHARGES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CARTHAGE, JASPER COUNTY, MISSOURI as follows:

SECTION I: The Mayor of the City of Carthage is hereby authorized to execute on behalf of the City of Carthage a Memorandum of Understanding between the City of Carthage and the Jasper County Sheriff’s Office providing for prisoner housing for inmates with municipal charges.

Term: This MOU is effective July 1st, 2018, and will expire June 30th, 2019. It may be extended for a term as mutually agreed to by the Parties. The terms of this MOU can be negotiated before the end of each calendar year, with changes to take effect January 1st of the following year.

The City will pay for 12 months of the current term in one lump sum. This sum will be \$44,945. Nature of the Project: The Jasper County Sheriff's Office will agree to provide prisoner housing for inmates with municipal charges.

ORDINANCE NO. _____

An Ordinance amending the Annual Operating and Capital Budget of the City of Carthage for fiscal years 2017-2018 and 2018-2019.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CARTHAGE, JASPER COUNTY, MISSOURI as follows:

SECTION I: The City of Carthage's 2017 - 2018 Annual Operating and Capital Budget for the **Public Safety Grant Fund**, is hereby amended to reflect a supplemental appropriation of \$400 from supplemental revenues of donations of \$400 to the General Tools & Supplies **Police Dept.** line item for the D.A.R.E. Supplies.

SECTION II: The City of Carthage's 2018 - 2019 Annual Operating and Capital Budget for the **Capital Improvements Fund**, is hereby amended to reflect a supplemental appropriation for carry-over projects of up to \$145,000 for the **River St & Fairview Intersection Project** from the unallocated and undesignated fund balance. This project was previously approved in Fiscal 2018 but was not able to be completed by the end of the fiscal year; the **Capital Improvements Fund**, is further amended to reflect a supplemental appropriation of up to \$269,995 for carry-over funds for repairs of City buildings damaged in the May 27, 2017 **hail storm** from the unallocated and undesignated fund balance and supplemental insurance proceeds of \$27,970.

SECTION III: The City of Carthage's 2018 - 2019 Annual Operating and Capital Budget for the **Parks/Storm Water Sales Tax Fund**, is hereby amended to reflect a supplemental appropriation for carry-over projects of up to \$233,000 from the unallocated and undesignated fund balance. These projects were previously approved in Fiscal 2018 but were unable to be completed by the end of the fiscal year. The Operating and Capital Budget for the **Parks/Storm Water Sales Tax Fund**, is hereby further amended to reflect a supplemental appropriation from the unallocated and undesignated fund balance of up to \$17,100 to the **Capital Outlay** line item for additional Concrete work for the Pool as part of the Central Park Walking Paths Project.

SECTION IV: The City of Carthage's 2018 - 2019 Annual Operating and Capital Budget for the **Myers Park Fund**, is hereby amended to reflect a supplemental appropriation for carry-over projects of up to \$160,000 for the Myers Park **Detention Pond Project** from the unallocated and undesignated fund balance. This project was previously approved in Fiscal 2018 but was unable to be completed by the end of the fiscal year.

SECTION V: The City of Carthage's 2018 - 2019 Annual Operating and Capital Budget for the **General Revenue Fund**, is hereby amended to reflect a supplemental appropriation to the **Capital Improvements Department**, Capital Outlay line item, for carry-over projects of \$4,000 for the **Central Park Fencing Project** from the unallocated and undesignated fund balance. This project was previously approved in Fiscal 2018 but was unable to be completed by the end of the fiscal year. The Operating and Capital Budget for the **General Revenue Fund**, is hereby further amended to reflect a supplemental appropriation from the unallocated and undesignated fund balance of \$109,200 to the **Central Municipal Activities Department**, **Legal Fees** line item and the **Police Department Salaries** line item of up to \$57,529 for an SRO position to provide services to the Carthage R-IX School District pursuant to the Memorandum of Understanding.

SECTION VI: This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval.

RESOLUTION NO. 1846

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR OF THE CITY OF CARTHAGE, MISSOURI, TO SIGN A MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING WITH CARTHAGE R-IX SCHOOL DISTRICT FOR THE EMPLOYMENT OF SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS (SRO).

WHEREAS, the Revised Statutes of Missouri (RSMo) Section 70.220 provide that any municipality may contract and cooperate with other political subdivisions; and

WHEREAS, Carthage R-IX School District (District) is the owner and operator of the Carthage School District system; and

WHEREAS, the City has provided the District with police officers assigned to the District to serve as the "School Resource Officers" in order to improve safety (real and perceived) in and around public schools, improve the perception of the police amongst youth in the community and improve the relationship between students and police ; and

WHEREAS, in order to continue the success of the School Resource Officer Program, the City and the District desire to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to establish policies and procedures regarding the number of School Resource Officers (SROs) required by the District, responsibility for employment of the SROs, equipment and training, and how the SROs are deployed; and

WHEREAS, the Council of the City of Carthage has determined that it will serve and be in the best interests of the City and its residents to enter into the MOU with the District;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CARTHAGE, MISSOURI, AS FOLLOWS:

The Mayor is hereby authorized to execute on behalf of the City of Carthage the Memorandum of Understanding with the District, a true copy of which is attached hereto and incorporated herein as if set out in full.

**Memorandum of Understanding
By and Between
Carthage R-IX School District and the City of Carthage**

THIS AGREEMENT, entered into this ____ day of _____, 2018, by and between the Carthage R-IX School District (District) and the City of Carthage (City).

This agreement will establish policies and procedures regarding the number of School Resource Officers (SROs) required by the District, responsibility for employment of the SROs, equipment and training, and how the SROs are deployed.

In consideration of the mutual commitments herein contained, the parties agree as follows:

The District will generally supervise two SROs. These will be full-time employees of the City, commissioned as law enforcement officers by the Carthage Police Department (CPD) and holding valid Missouri POST licensing. The SROs will work under nine-month contracts, as determined by the District.

1. The District will handle all employment issues related to the two SROs. The District will designate supervisors who will determine each SRO's assignments, scheduling and deployment. Salary and benefits for the SROs will be administered by the City.
2. The CPD will provide employment and law enforcement "commissions" for these two officers, uniforms and personal equipment standard for all patrol officers, and annual training to ensure the officers maintain proper licensing in Missouri. The CPD will collaborate with the District in recruiting and hiring the SROs, but they will remain City employees.
3. The CPD will ensure the SROs receive adequate training required for an SRO, that their equipment is properly maintained, and the SROs have access to all resources necessary to investigate crimes, complete police reports, etc. Training offered at the CPD will be free to the District-managed SROs. The cost of outside training will be paid for by the District or cost shared by the District and the City.
4. The SROs will be deployed at the will of the District; they will serve at games, concerts, and other after-school events at the discretion and as stipulated by the District. If an off-duty CPD officer other than the District-managed SRO is required in addition to the District-managed SRO, the rate of pay will be \$25 per hour and the CPD officer will receive specific instructions and expectations for each event. The District will report to the Chief of Police if the CPD officer does not meet its expectations.
5. The SROs will be employed under a nine-month contract and their salary will be prorated based on a full time police officer's salary. In other words, the nine month SROs will receive approximately 75% of the salary of a full time police officer. They will also receive all benefits any other full time CPD officer receives, including overtime, if applicable, during the nine-month period. The City will receive

reimbursement from the District for these two positions at 100% of the rate of pay and benefits for the nine-month period only. The contract will be effective for a period of three (3) school years and will include an option for termination of the contract by the District or the City.

6. The CPD will employ one police officer to be assigned as an SRO whose duties and schedule will be determined by the CPD. This officer will not only have SRO duties, but will also serve as a liaison between the District-managed SROs and the CPD. The City SRO will be the conduit for all serious criminal investigations and will provide direction to the District-managed SROs regarding criminal laws and issues requiring the guidance of an experienced police officer.

The City SRO will, in a timely manner, report to the Superintendent of Schools and the Chief of Police any misconduct or training issues concerning the two District-managed SROs. The salary for the City SRO will be reimbursed by the District for this position at 75% of the annual pay and benefits of a full time CPD officer.

The City currently has two vehicles assigned to SRO duty. The City will retain one vehicle to be assigned to the City SRO, and will gift the other vehicle to the District to be used by the SROs at the District's discretion.

If either of the District SROs choose to work for the City in the summer when their nine-month contracts are not in effect, separate employment agreements will be made with the City and will not have any effect on this MOU or any agreement between the District and the City.

"Rosenberg's Rules of Order"

(Simple Rules of Parliamentary Procedure for the 21st Century)

Introduction

The rules of procedure at meetings should be simple enough for most people to understand. Unfortunately, that has not always been the case. Virtually all clubs, associations, boards, councils and bodies follow a set of rules - "Robert's Rules of Order" - which are embodied in a small, but complex, book. Virtually no one I know has actually read this book cover to cover. Worse yet, the book was written for another time, and for another purpose. If one is chairing or running a Parliament, then "Robert's Rules of Order" is a dandy and quite useful handbook for procedure in that complex setting. On the other hand, if one is running a meeting of, say, a 5-member body with a few members of the public in attendance, a simplified version of the rules of parliamentary procedure is in order.

Hence, the birth of "Rosenberg's Rules of Order."

What follows is my version of the rules of parliamentary procedure, based on my 20 years of experience chairing meetings in state and local government. These rules have been simplified for the smaller bodies we chair or in which we participate, slimmed down for the 21st Century, yet retaining the basic tenets of order to which we have grown accustomed.

This treatise on modern parliamentary procedure is built on a foundation supported by the following four pillars: (1) Rules should establish order. The first purpose of rules of parliamentary procedure is to establish a framework for the orderly conduct of meetings. (2) Rules should be clear. Simple rules lead to wider understanding and participation. Complex rules create two classes: those who understand and participate; and those who do not fully understand and do not fully participate. (3) Rules should be user friendly. That is, the rules must be simple enough that the public is invited into the body and feels that it has participated in the process. (4) Rules should enforce the will of the majority while protecting the rights of the minority. The ultimate purpose of rules of procedure is to encourage discussion and to facilitate decision-making by the body. In a democracy, majority rules. The rules must enable the majority to express itself and fashion a result, while permitting the minority to also express itself, but not dominate, and fully participate in the process.

The Role of the Chair

While all members of the body should know and understand the rules of parliamentary procedure, it is the Chair of the body who is charged with applying the rules in the conduct of the meeting. The Chair should be well versed in those rules. The Chair, for all intents and purposes, makes the final ruling on the rules every time the Chair states an action. In fact, all decisions by the Chair are final unless overruled by the body itself.

Since the Chair runs the conduct of the meeting, it is usual courtesy for the Chair to play a less active role in the debate and discussion than other members of the body. This does not mean that the Chair should not participate in the debate or discussion. To the contrary, the Chair as a member of the body has the full right to participate in the debate, discussion and decision-making of the body. What the Chair should do, however, is strive to be the last to speak at the discussion and debate stage, and the Chair should not make or second a motion unless the Chair is convinced that no other member of the body will do so at that point in time.

The Basic Format for an Agenda Item Discussion

Formal meetings normally have a written, often published agenda. Informal meetings may have only an oral or understood agenda. In either case, the meeting is governed by the agenda and the agenda constitutes the body's agreed-upon roadmap for the meeting. And each agenda item can be handled by the Chair in the following basic format:

First, the Chair should clearly announce the agenda item number and should clearly state what the agenda item subject is. The Chair should then announce the format (which follows) that will be followed in considering the agenda item.

Second, following that agenda format, the Chair should invite the appropriate person or persons to report on the item, including any recommendation that they might have. The appropriate person or persons may be the Chair, a member of the body, a staff person, or a committee chair charged with providing input on the agenda item.

Third, the Chair should ask members of the body if they have any technical questions of clarification. At this point, members of the body may ask clarifying questions to the person or persons who reported on the item, and that person or persons should be given time to respond.

Fourth, the Chair should invite public comments, or if appropriate at a formal meeting, should open the public meeting for public input. If numerous members of the public indicate a desire to speak to the subject, the Chair may limit the time of public speakers. At the conclusion of the public comments, the Chair should announce that public input has concluded (or the public hearing as the case may be is closed).

Fifth, the Chair should invite a motion. The Chair should announce the name of the member of the body who makes the motion.

Sixth, the Chair should determine if any member of the body wishes to second the motion. The Chair should announce the name of the member of the body who seconds the motion. (It is normally good practice for a motion to require a second before proceeding with it, to ensure that it is not just one member of the body who is interested in a particular approach. However, a second is not an absolute requirement, and the Chair can proceed with consideration and vote on a motion even when there is no second. This is a matter left to the discretion of the Chair.)

Seventh, if the motion is made and seconded, the Chair should make sure everyone understands the motion. This is done in one of three ways: (1) The Chair can ask the maker of the motion to repeat it. (2) The Chair can repeat the motion. (3) The Chair can ask the secretary or the clerk of the body to repeat the motion.

Eighth, the Chair should now invite discussion of the motion by the body. If there is no desired discussion, or after the discussion has ended, the Chair should announce that the body will vote on the motion. If there has been no discussion or very brief discussion, then the vote on the motion should proceed immediately and there is no need to repeat the motion. If there has been substantial discussion, then it is normally best to make sure everyone understands the motion by repeating it.

Ninth, the Chair takes a vote. Simply asking for the "ayes", and then asking for the "nays" normally does this. If members of the body do not vote, then they "abstain". Unless the rules of the body provide otherwise (or unless a super-majority is required as delineated later in these rules) then a simple majority determines whether the motion passes or is defeated.

Tenth, the Chair should announce the result of the vote and should announce what action (if any) the body has taken. In announcing the result, the Chair should indicate the names of the members of the body, if any, who voted in the minority on the motion. This announcement might take the following form: "The motion passes by a vote of 3-2, with Smith and Jones dissenting. We have passed the motion requiring 10 days notice for all future meetings of this body."

Motions in General

Motions are the vehicles for decision-making by a body. It is usually best to have a motion before the body prior to commencing discussion of an agenda item. This helps the body focus.

Motions are made in a simple two-step process. First, the Chair should recognize the member of the body. Second, the member of the body makes a motion by preceding the member's desired approach with the words: "I move" So, a typical motion might be: "I move that we give 10-day's notice in the future for all our meetings."

The Chair usually initiates the motion by either (1) Inviting the members of the body to make a motion. "A motion at this time would be in order." (2) Suggesting a motion to the members of the body. "A motion would be in order that we give 10-day's notice in the future for all our meetings." (3) Making the motion. As noted, the Chair has every right as a member of the body to make a motion, but should normally do so only if the Chair wishes to make a motion on an item but is convinced that no other member of the body is willing to step forward to do so at a particular time.

The Three Basic Motions

There are three motions that are the most common and recur often at meetings:

The basic motion. The basic motion is the one that puts forward a decision for the body's consideration. A basic motion might be: "I move that we create a 5-member committee to plan and put on our annual fundraiser."

The motion to amend. If a member wants to change a basic motion that is before the body, they would move to amend it. A motion to amend might be: "I move that we amend the motion to have a 10-member committee." A motion to amend takes the basic motion which is before the body and seeks to change it in some way.

The substitute motion. If a member wants to completely do away with the basic motion that is before the body, and put a new motion before the body, they would move a substitute motion. A substitute motion might be: "I move a substitute motion that we cancel the annual fundraiser this year."

"Motions to amend" and "substitute motions" are often confused. But they are quite different, and their effect (if passed) is quite different. A motion to amend seeks to retain the basic motion on the floor, but modify it in some way. A substitute motion seeks to throw out the basic motion on the floor, and substitute a new and different motion for it. The decision as to whether a motion is really a "motion to amend" or a "substitute motion" is left to the chair. So that if a member makes what that member calls a "motion to amend", but the Chair determines that it is really a "substitute motion", then the Chair's designation governs.

Multiple Motions Before the Body

There can be up to three motions on the floor at the same time. The Chair can reject a fourth motion until the Chair has dealt with the three that are on the floor and has resolved them.

When there are two or three motions on the floor (after motions and seconds) at the same time, the vote should proceed first on the last motion that is made. So, for example, assume the first motion is a basic "motion to have a 5-member committee to plan and put on our annual fundraiser." During the discussion of this motion, a member might make a second motion to "amend the main motion to have a 10-member committee, not a 5-member committee to plan and put

on our annual fundraiser." And perhaps, during that discussion, a member makes yet a third motion as a "substitute motion that we not have an annual fundraiser this year." The proper procedure would be as follows:

First, the Chair would deal with the third (the last) motion on the floor, the substitute motion. After discussion and debate, a vote would be taken first on the third motion. If the substitute motion passed, it would be a substitute for the basic motion and would eliminate it. The first motion would be moot, as would the second motion (which sought to amend the first motion), and the action on the agenda item would be completed on the passage by the body of the third motion (the substitute motion). No vote would be taken on the first or second motions. On the other hand, if the substitute motion (the third motion) failed then the Chair would proceed to consideration of the second (now, the last) motion on the floor, the motion to amend.

Second, if the substitute motion failed, the Chair would now deal with the second (now, the last) motion on the floor, the motion to amend. The discussion and debate would focus strictly on the amendment (should the committee be 5 members or 10 members). If the motion to amend passed the Chair would now move to consider the main motion (the first motion) as amended. If the motion to amend failed the Chair would now move to consider the main motion (the first motion) in its original format, not amended.

Third, the Chair would now deal with the first motion that was placed on the floor. The original motion would either be in its original format (5-member committee), or, if amended, would be in its amended format (10-member committee). And the question on the floor for discussion and decision would be whether a committee should plan and put on the annual fundraiser.

To Debate or Not to Debate

The basic rule of motions is that they are subject to discussion and debate. Accordingly, basic motions, motions to amend, and substitute motions are all eligible, each in their turn, for full discussion before and by the body. The debate can continue as long as members of the body wish to discuss an item, subject to the decision of the Chair that it is time to move on and take action.

There are exceptions to the general rule of free and open debate on motions. The exceptions all apply when there is a desire of the body to move on. The following motions are not debatable (that is, when the following motions are made and seconded, the Chair must immediately call for a vote of the body without debate on the motion):

A motion to adjourn. This motion, if passed, requires the body to immediately adjourn to its next regularly scheduled meeting. It requires a simple majority vote.

A motion to recess. This motion, if passed, requires the body to immediately take a recess. Normally, the Chair determines the length of the recess which may be a few minutes or an hour. It requires a simple majority vote.

A motion to fix the time to adjourn. This motion, if passed, requires the body to adjourn the meeting at the specific time set in the motion. For example, the motion might be: "I move we adjourn this meeting at midnight." It requires a simple majority vote.

A motion to table. This motion, if passed, requires discussion of the agenda item to be halted and the agenda item to be placed on "hold". The motion can contain a specific time in which the item can come back to the body: "I move we table this item until our regular meeting in October." Or the motion can contain no specific time for the return of the item, in which case a motion to take the item off the table and bring it back to the body will have to be taken at a future meeting. A motion to table an item (or to bring it back to the body) requires a simple majority vote.

A motion to limit debate. The most common form of this motion is to say: "I move the previous question" or "I move the question" or "I call the question." When a member of the body makes such a motion, the member is really saying: "I've had enough debate. Let's get on with the vote". When such a motion is made, the Chair should ask for a second, stop debate, and vote on the motion to limit debate. The motion to limit debate requires a 2/3 vote of the body. Note: that a motion to limit debate could include a time limit. For example: "I move we limit debate on this agenda item to 15 minutes." Even in this format, the motion to limit debate requires a 2/3 vote of the body. A similar motion is a **motion to object to consideration of an item.** This motion is not debatable, and if passed, precludes the body from even considering an item on the agenda. It also requires a 2/3 vote.

Majority and Super-Majority Votes

In a democracy, a simple majority vote determines a question. A tie vote means the motion fails. So in a 7-member body, a vote of 4-3 passes the motion. A vote of 3-3 with one abstention means the motion fails. If one member is absent and the vote is 3-3, the motion still fails.

All motions require a simple majority, but there are a few exceptions. The exceptions come up when the body is taking an action which, effectively, cuts off the ability of a minority of the body to take an action or discuss an item. These extraordinary motions require a 2/3 majority (a super-majority) to pass:

Motion to limit debate. Whether a member says "I move the previous question" or "I move the question" or "I call the question" or "I move to limit debate", it all amounts to an attempt to cut off the ability of the minority to discuss an item, and it requires a 2/3 vote to pass.

Motion to close nominations. When choosing officers of the body (like the Chair) nominations are in order either from a nominating committee or from the floor of the body. A motion to close nominations effectively cuts off the right of the minority to nominate officers, and it requires a 2/3 vote to pass.

Motion to object to the consideration of a question. Normally, such a motion is unnecessary since the objectionable item can be tabled, or defeated straight up. However, when members of a body do not even want an item on the agenda to be considered, then such a motion is in order. It is not debatable, and it requires a 2/3 vote to pass.

Motion to suspend the rules. This motion is debatable, but requires a 2/3 vote to pass. If the body has its own rules of order, conduct or procedure, this motion allows the body to suspend the rules for a particular purpose. For example, the body (a private club) might have a rule prohibiting the attendance at meetings by non-club members. A motion to suspend the rules would be in order to allow a non-club member to attend a meeting of the club on a particular date or on a particular agenda item.

The Motion to Reconsider

There is a special and unique motion that requires a bit of explanation all by itself: the motion to reconsider. A tenet of parliamentary procedure is finality. After vigorous discussion, debate, perhaps disagreement and a vote, there must be some closure to the issue. And so, after a vote is taken, the matter is deemed closed, subject only to a re-opener if a proper motion to reconsider is made.

A motion to reconsider requires a majority vote to pass, but there are two special rules that apply only to the motion to reconsider. First, is timing. A motion to reconsider must be made at the meeting where the item was first voted upon or at the very next meeting of the body. A motion to reconsider made at a later time is untimely. (The body, however, can always vote to suspend the rules and by a 2/3 majority, can allow a motion to reconsider to be made at another time.) Second, a motion to reconsider can only be made by certain members of the body. Accordingly, a motion to reconsider can only be made by a member who voted in the majority on the original motion. If such a member has a change of heart, he or she can make the motion to reconsider (any other member of the body may second the motion). If a member who voted in the minority seeks to make the motion to reconsider, it must be ruled out of order. The purpose of this rule is finality. If a member of the minority could make a motion to reconsider, then the item could be brought back to the body again and again. That would defeat the purpose of finality.

If the motion to reconsider passes, then the original matter is back before the body, and a new original motion is then in order. The matter can be discussed and debated as if it were on the floor for the first time.

Courtesy and Decorum

The rules of order are meant to create an atmosphere where the members of the body and the members of the public can attend to business efficiently, fairly and with full participation. At the same time, it is up to the Chair and the members of the body to maintain common courtesy and decorum. Unless the setting is very informal, it is always best for only one person at a time to have the floor, and it is always best for every speaker to be first recognized by the Chair before proceeding to speak.

The Chair should always ensure that debate and discussion of an agenda item focuses on the item and the policy in question, not the personalities of the members of the body. Debate on policy is healthy, debate on personalities is not. The Chair has the right to cut off discussion that is too personal, is too loud, or is too crude.

Debate and discussion should be focused, but free and open. In the interest of time, the Chair may, however, limit the time allotted to speakers, including members of the body.

Can a member of the body interrupt the speaker? The general rule is "no." There are, however, exceptions. A speaker may be interrupted for the following reasons:

Privilege. The proper interruption would be: "point of privilege." The Chair would then ask the interrupter to "state your point." Appropriate points of privilege relate to anything that would interfere with the normal comfort of the meeting. For example, the room may be too hot or too cold, or a blowing fan might interfere with a person's ability to hear.

Order. The proper interruption would be: "point of order." Again, the Chair would ask the interrupter to "state your point." Appropriate points of order relate to anything that would not be considered appropriate conduct of the meeting. For example, if the Chair moved on to a vote on a motion that permits debate without allowing that discussion or debate.

Appeal. If the Chair makes a ruling that a member of the body disagrees with, that member may appeal the ruling of the chair. If the motion is seconded, and after debate, if it passes by a simple majority vote, then the ruling of the Chair is deemed reversed.

Call for orders of the day. This is simply another way of saying, "Let's return to the agenda." If a member believes that the body has drifted from the agreed-upon agenda, such a call may be made. It does not require a vote, and when the Chair discovers that the agenda has not been followed, the Chair simply reminds the body to return to the agenda item properly before them. If the Chair fails to do so, the Chair's determination may be appealed.

Withdraw a motion. During debate and discussion of a motion, the maker of the motion on the floor, at any time, may interrupt a speaker to withdraw his or her motion from the floor. The motion is immediately deemed withdrawn, although the Chair may ask the person who seconded the motion if he or she wishes to make the motion, and any other member may make the motion if properly recognized.

Special Notes About Public Input

The rules outlined above will help make meetings very public-friendly. But in addition, and particularly for the Chair, it is wise to remember three special rules that apply to each agenda item:

Rule One: Tell the public what the body will be doing.

Rule Two: Keep the public informed while the body is doing it.

Rule Three: When the body has acted, tell the public what the body did.
